CGSC honors authors, instructors

Command and General Staff College faculty and staff gathered in the Lewis and Clark Center's Marshall Auditorium Aug. 6 to see some of their colleagues recognized for their contributions to the college.

Deputy Commandant Brig. Gen. Mark O'Neill said the focus for the next week will be the new building that houses CGSC, but right then he wanted to recognize the faculty and

"In fact, the Command and General Staff College is made up of the people sitting in these very ... chairs," O'Neill said. "The college hasn't changed."

O'Neill told the staff and faculty that they were building the future of not only the institution and the Army, but the armies of many other nations and sister services.

O'Neill likened the current engagements in Iraq and Afghanistan to a world war.

"You, the staff and faculty of the college, are preparing the officers of the United States, and our friends and allies, to wage that world war," O'Neill-said.

Faculty and staff were recognized with Golden Pen, Instructors of the Year and service awards.

The Golden Pen program recognizes faculty for published writing contributions that enhance the mission of the college. Faculty publica-tions are nominated by the GPA review board committee and approved by the CGSC deputy commandant.

Awards are given on three levels: gold, bronze and silver. The gold award is for a book or book-length series of articles. An article or chapter of a book in a publication is eligible for the silver award and the

bronze award recognizes a significant book review, op-ed piece or letter to the editor.


